The Secure Communities program, from 2008, drafted promotional materials indicating a jurisdiction may “opt out” of the program that sends fingerprints to the federal government for criminal and immigration checks. ICE deployed the technology slowly at first to ensure the operations were smooth and to ensure jurisdictions were comfortable with the program.
