DEFENDANT'S VAUGHN INDEX

Pursuant to the Court's September 8, 2014 Order, the United States Department of Defense hereby submits its supplemental *Vaughn* Index. The various changes between the attached document and the *Vaughn* Index filed with the defendants' motion for summary judgment on January 28, 2014 (ECF No. 25-5), are briefly set forth below.

- The "Partial Denial/Full Denial/Full Release" column has been replaced with a column entitled "Exemptions Claimed." This column lists all of the particular exemptions applied to a particular document. Where a document was released in full, the "Exemptions Claimed" column notes that no exemptions were applied. The exemptions cited for each document in the "Exemptions Claimed" column are based on the descriptions contained in the column previously titled as "Declaration."
- The column previously titled "Declaration" is now titled as "Description."
- In the "Description" column, the basis for the Department of Defense's application of the deliberative process privilege of Exemption 5 has been expanded based upon the

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description of the material in defendants' summary judgment brief (ECF No. 25) and the Bloom Declaration (ECF No. 25-2).

- Also in the "Description" column, the basis for the Department of Defense's application of Exemption 7E has been expanded based upon the description of the material in defendants' summary judgment brief (ECF No. 25) and the Bloom Declaration (ECF No. 25-2).
- The Department of Defense has included an "Index of FOIA Exemptions Applied" after the document-by-document index, which is organized by exemption and lists the documents over which a particular exemption was claimed.
